Banging, Knocking, or Hissing

Unusual noises often point to water hammer, trapped air, valve problems, or improper piping conditions. Persistent sounds should be investigated before they lead to further damage.

Rising Energy Costs

Higher fuel or utility costs without increased production may indicate steam loss. Leaks, damaged insulation, and poorly performing traps or valves are common sources of wasted energy.

Frequent Equipment Shutdowns

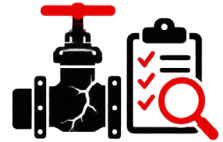
Repeated shutdowns or resets may point to problems in the steam distribution or control system. Frequent interruptions also increase wear and can signal a larger reliability issue.
